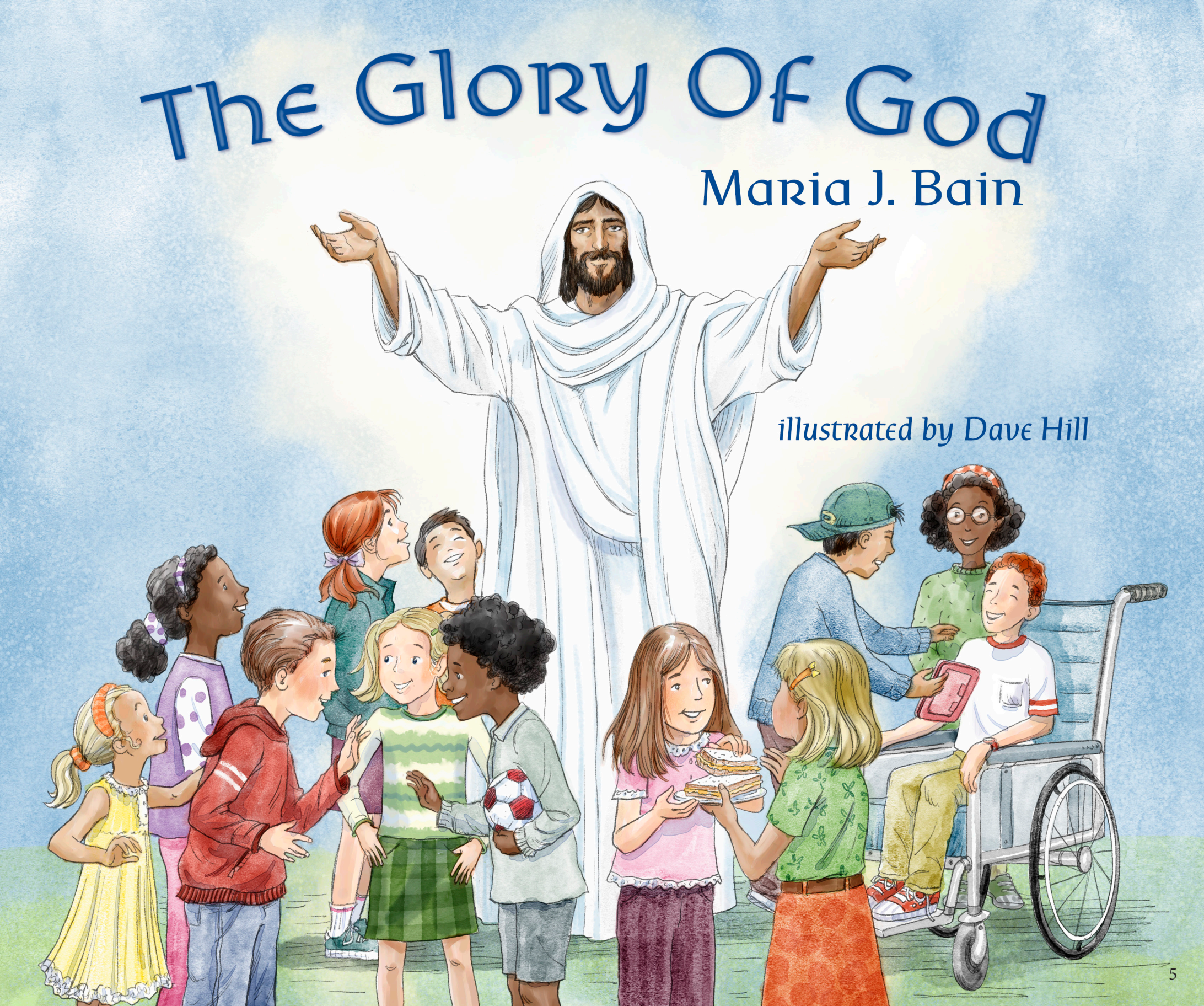
Author’s Note

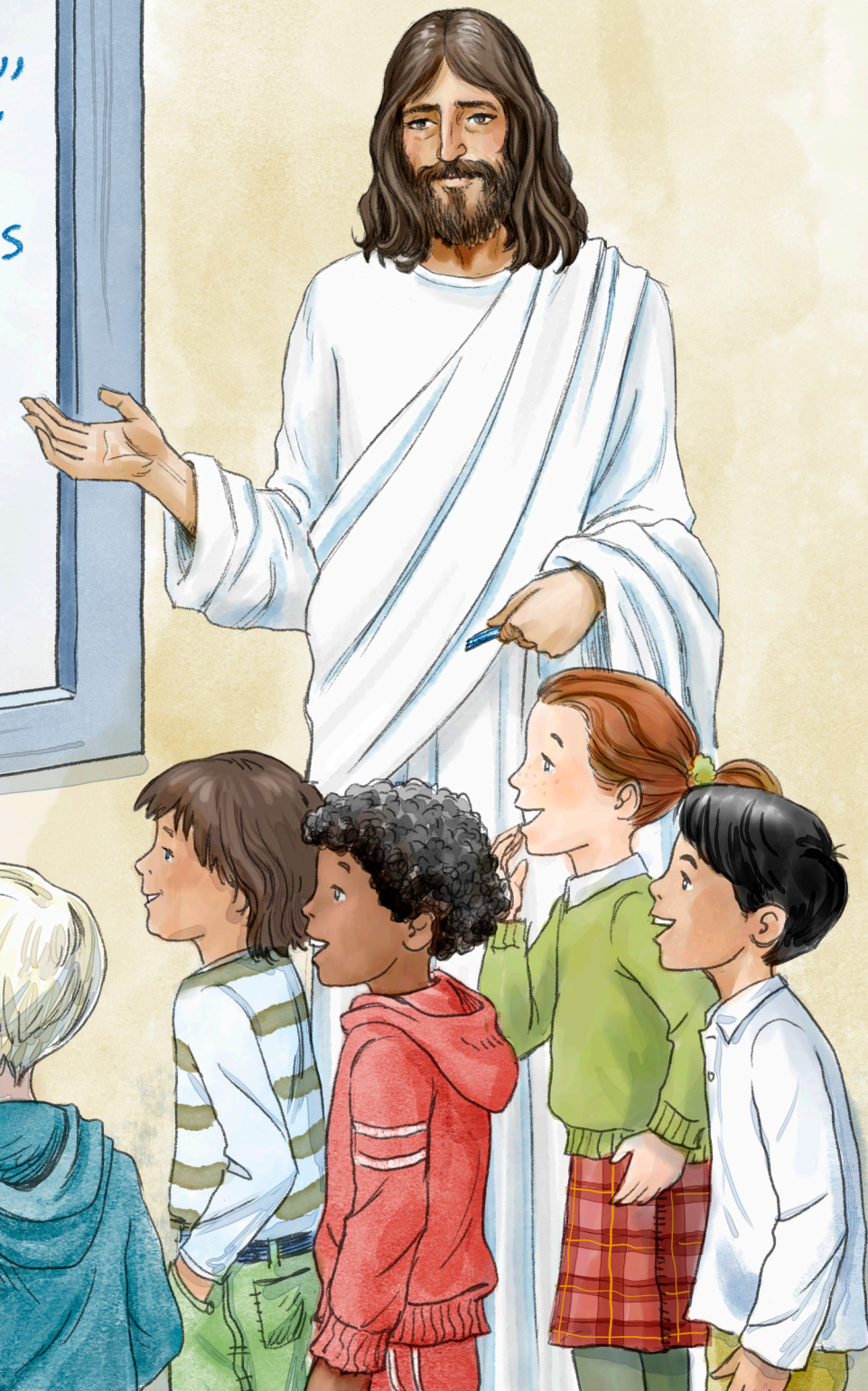

What does this mean?

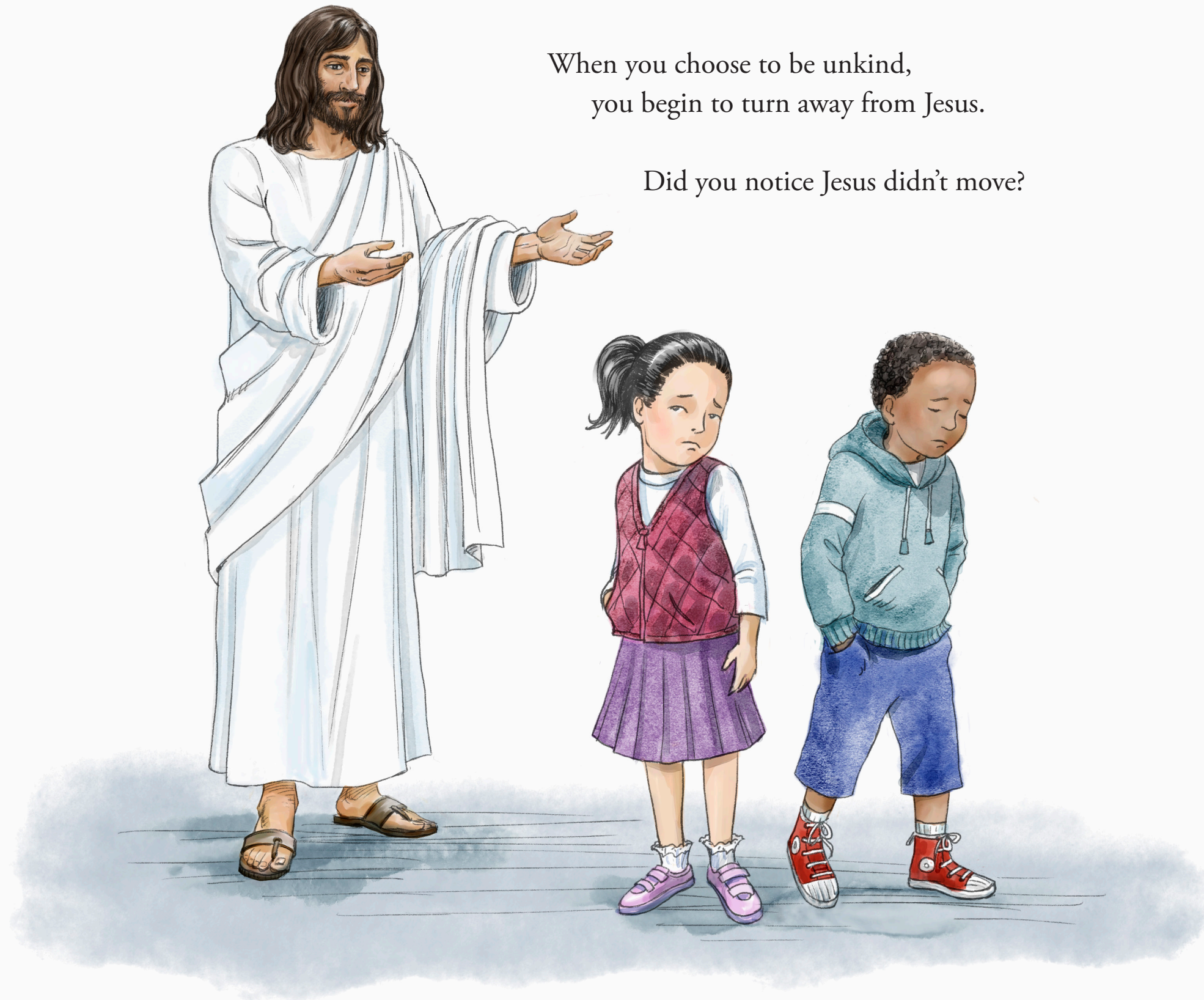


At recess, you have a choice to be kind to others
or to leave someone out.

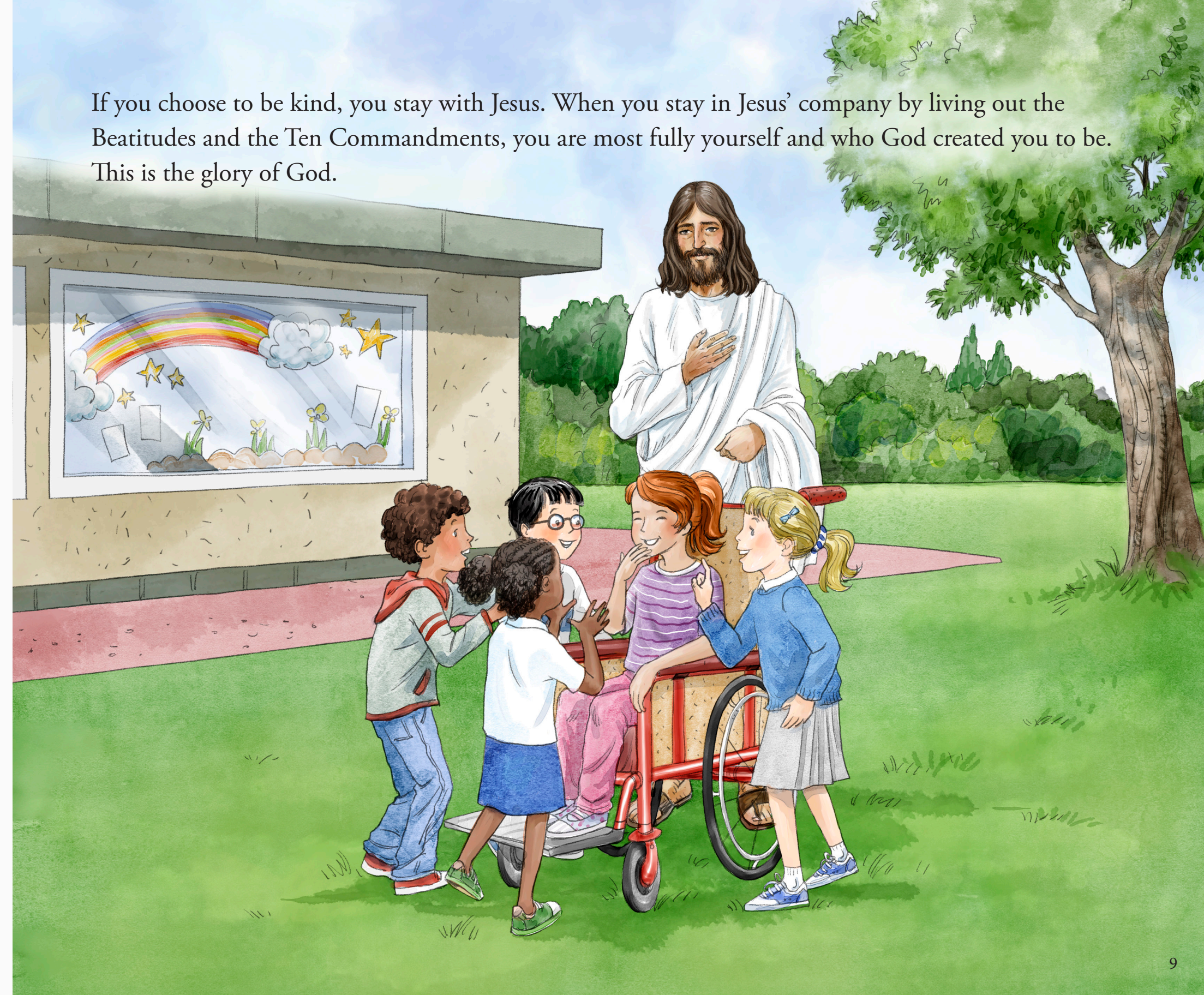


When you choose to be unkind,

Blessed are the clean of heart, for they will see God.

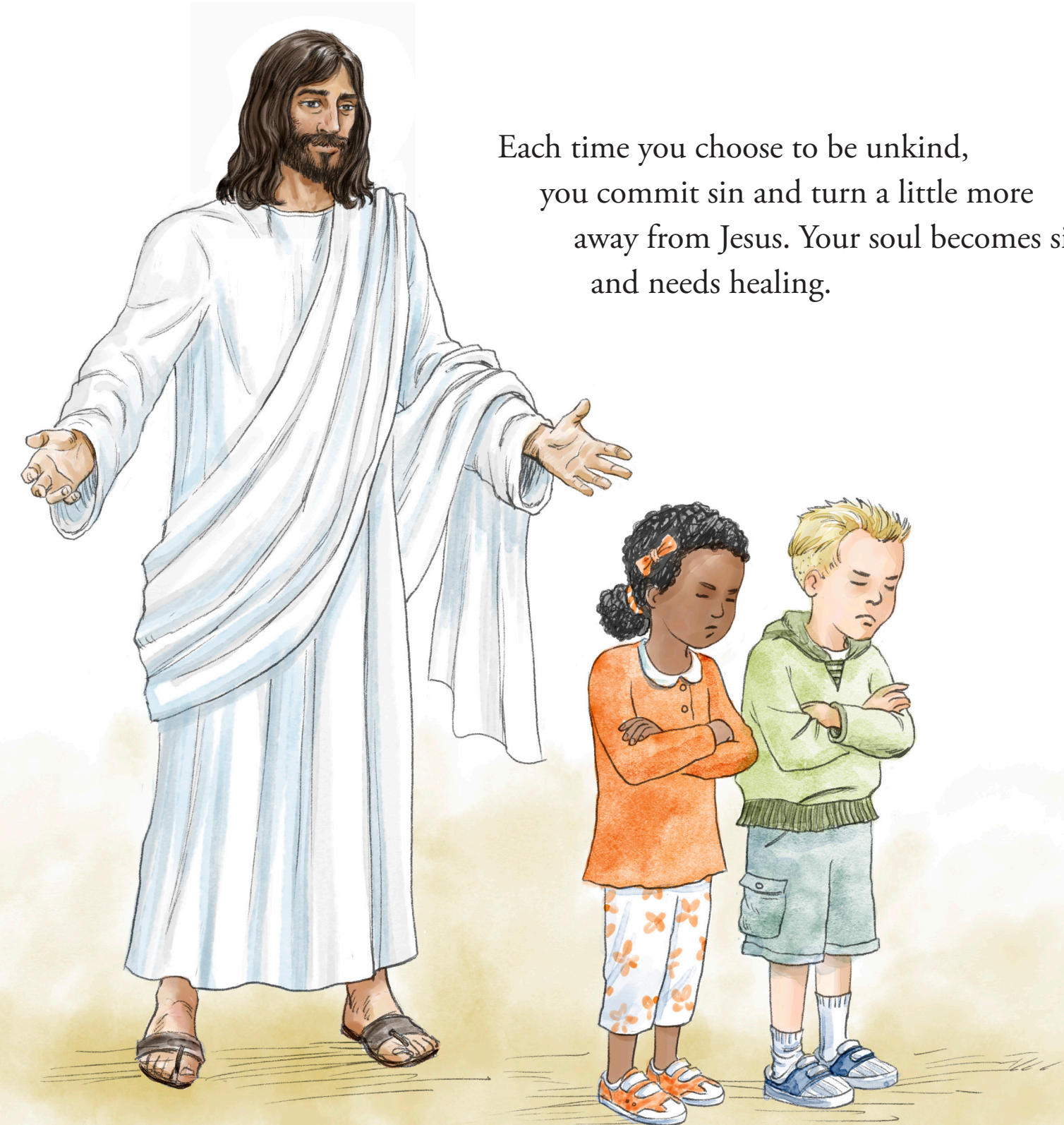
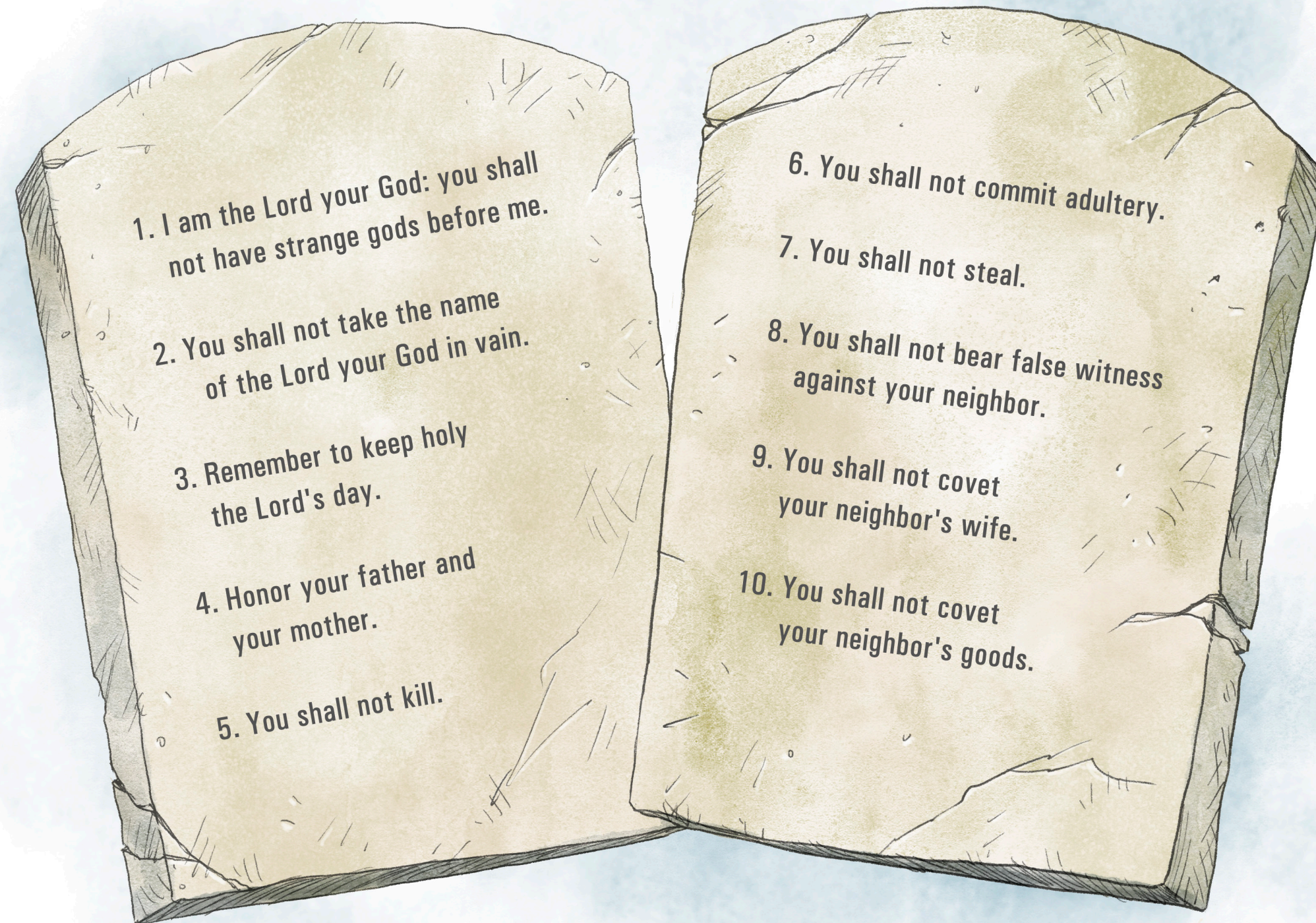
Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

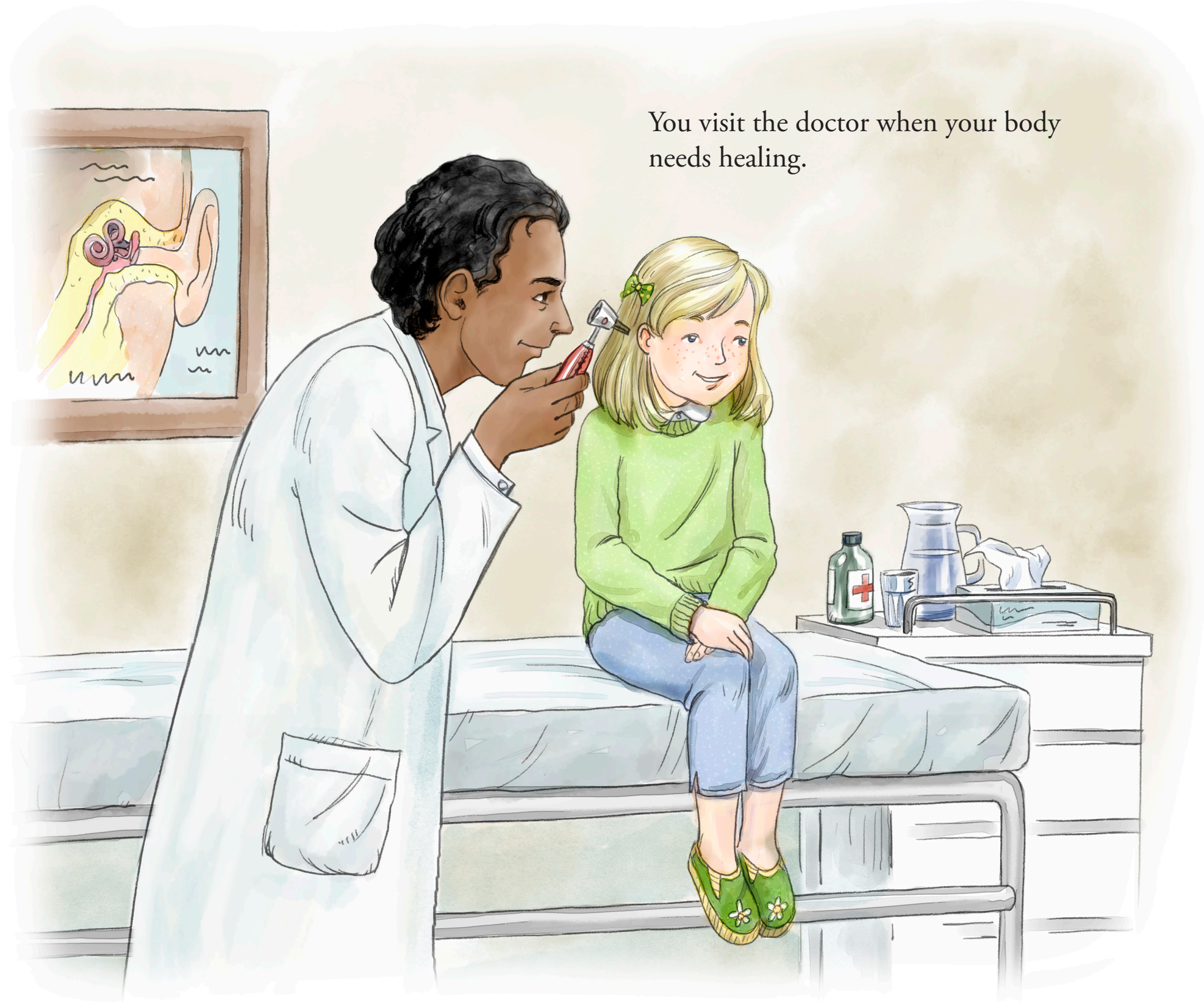

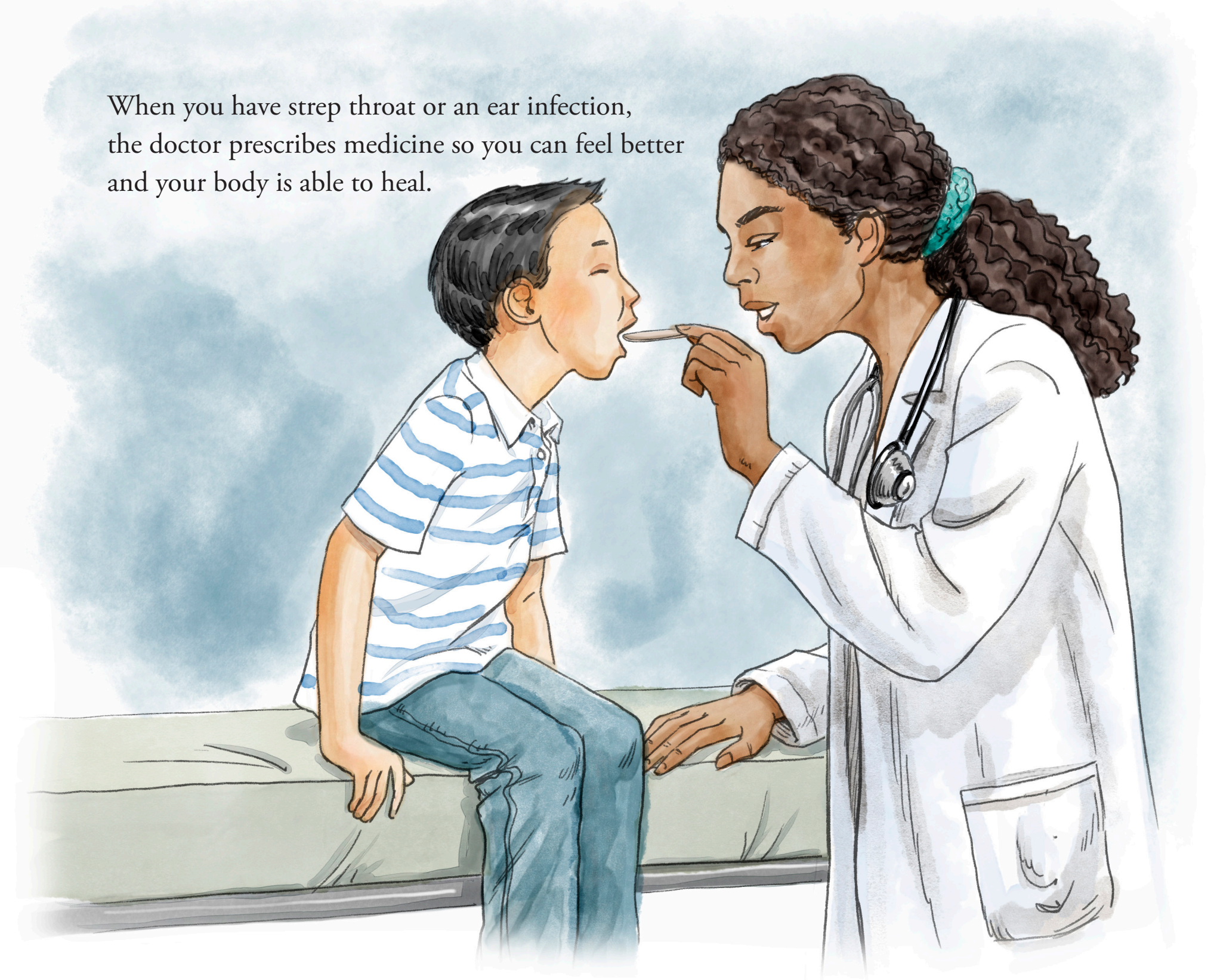
The Ten Commandments

You tell him all the ways you have chosen to turn away from him.

You express your sorrow for offending Jesus and hurting yourself and others by reciting a prayer called the Act of Contrition.

O my God,

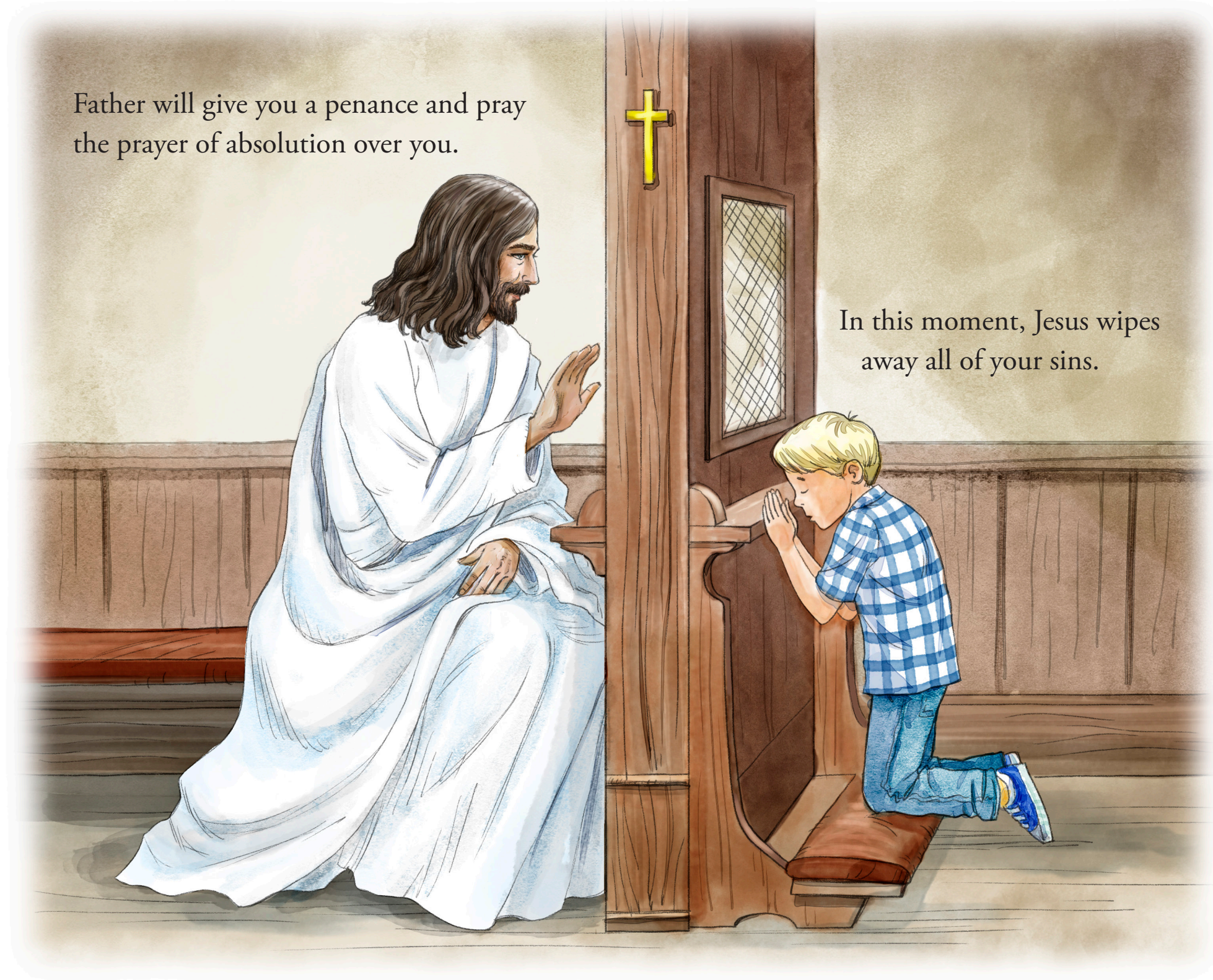
*I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee,

away all of your sins.

Now it is time to fulfill your penance. This is when you make reparation for your sins, show God you are truly sorry, and thank him.



Every day you will have many choices.

Just remember, when you choose to be in Jesus' company, you are a reflection of God's glory because you are being who God created you to be.



An Examination of Conscience for Children

Responsibilities to God:

- Have I prayed every day?
- Have I prayed my morning prayers and night prayers?
- Have I prayed with my parents and family?
- Have I been moody and rebellious about praying and going to church on Sunday?
- Have I asked the Holy Spirit to help me whenever I have been tempted to sin?
- Have I asked the Holy Spirit to help me do what is right?

Responsibilities to others:

- Have I been obedient and respectful to my parents?
- Have I lied or been deceitful to them or to others?
- Have I been arrogant, stubborn or rebellious?
- Have I talked back to parents, teachers or other adults?
- Have I pouted and been moody?
- Have I been selfish toward my parents, brothers, and sisters, teachers, or my friends and schoolmates?
- Have I gotten angry at them? Have I hit anyone?
- Have I held grudges or not forgiven others?
- Have I treated other children with respect or have I made fun of them and called them names?
- Have I used bad language?
- Have I stolen anything? Have I returned it?
- Have I performed my responsibilities, such as homework and household chores?
- Have I been helpful and affectionate toward my family?
- Have I been kind and generous with my friends?

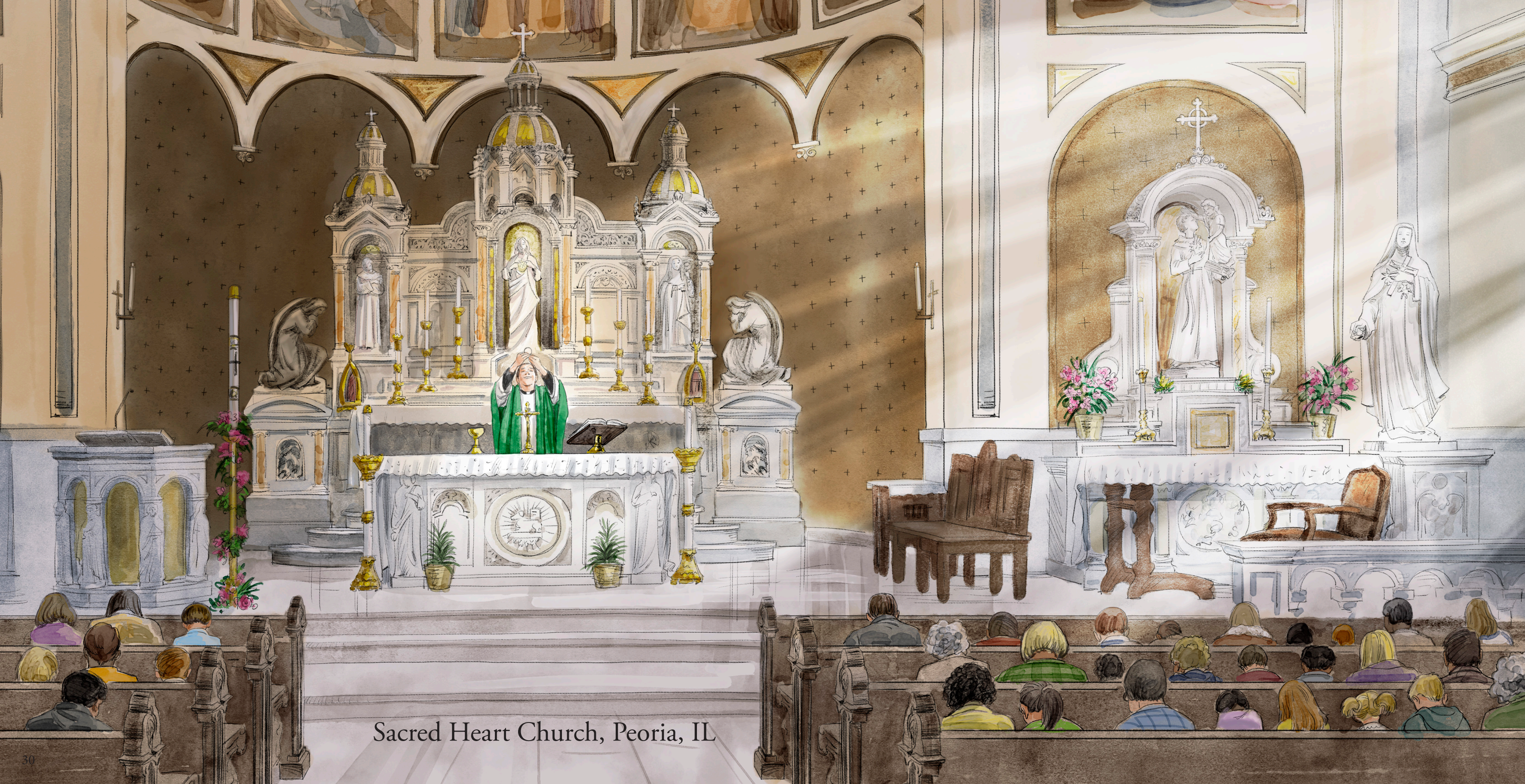
